### ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S NOTES



PRESS CLIPPINGS AND AUDIENCE QUOTES ABOUT THIS PLAY INCLUDE PLENTY OF REFERENCES TO THE BALANCED NATURE OF ITS ARGUMENT AND THE PLAYWRIGHT'S GENEROSITY IN NOT TAKING SIDES.

He is generous, alright, but a considerable amount of that generosity is measured in the volume of shade that he casually tosses in the direction of ongoing colonialism. Without giving anything away, consider the ease with which the cottager attaches timelessness to something that spans less than a single generation. There's also a reference to the use of modern

technology while harvesting a traditional resource, as though the two things should be mutually exclusive. The notion that Indigenous people should exist in a kind of temporal vacuum is extremely problematic and, unfortunately, doesn't seem to be going away. I'm grateful that Indigenous artists from around the globe continue to challenge that position with increasingly effective work — even cursory visits to the magnificent  $\dot{A}badkone$ ,  $Continuous\ Fire$  at the National Gallery and Inaabiwin at the Ottawa Art Gallery will make this point more effectively than I can hope to do in 300 words. If literature is more your bag, then, in addition to the suggestions on our  $Stages\ and\ Pages\ list$  (I especially endorse Chelsea Vowel's  $Indigenous\ Writes$ ), I highly recommend several titles from my own reading list:

- · My Conversations With Canadians by Lee Maracle
- · All My Relations by Tanya Talaga
- · The Inconvenient Indian by Thomas King
- · Dancing on Our Turtle's Back by Leanne Betasamosake Simpson

All of these books provide a strong sense of the complexities of Indigenous life here, and I encourage everyone to explore the ideas that these authors offer. Thank you for joining us for *Cottagers and Indians* and thank you to our wonderful friends and colleagues at the Tarragon Theatre for sharing this production with Ottawa.

#### DREW HAYDEN TAYLOR - PLAYWRIGHT

During the last twenty-five years of his life, Drew Hayden Taylor has done many things, most of which he is proud of. An Ojibway from the Curve Lake First Nations in Ontario, he has worn many hats in his literary career, from performing stand-up comedy at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., to being Artistic Director of Canada's premiere Native theatre company, Native Earth Performing Arts. He has been an award-winning playwright (with over 70 productions of his work), a journalist/columnist (appearing regularly in several Canadian newspapers and magazines), short-story writer, novelist, television scriptwriter, and has worked on over 17 documentaries exploring the Native experience. Most notably, he wrote and directed REDSKINS, TRICKSTERS AND PUPPY STEW, a documentary on Native humour for the National Film Board of Canada.

### SAGE PAUL - COSTUME DESIGN

Sage Paul is an urban Dene woman and a member of the English River First Nation. She champions community, sovereignty and resistance for balance and makes fashion, costume and craft. Some design credits include: "Awakening" (Short Film, Danis Goulet), "Robin's Hood" (Short Film, Kent Monkman), Munschtime! (Young Peoples Theatre), Almighty Voice and His Wife (Theatre Kingston), Divine (Storefront Theatre), and Gashkigwaaso (Dance, Waawaate Fobister). Some of her work has shown at the Royal Ontario Museum, The Centre for Craft, Creativity and Design (North Carolina, USA), and a curated program at Western Canada Fashion Week by Ociciwan Contemporary Art Collective. In 2017,

Sage received the Design Exchange RBC Emerging Designer Award in the fashion category, was recognized by FLARE Magazine in their #HowlMadelt campaign that celebrates 100+ talented and ambitious Canadian women and was honoured by the Ontario Ministry of the Status of Women as a trailblazing woman who is transforming Ontario. Sage is the founder of Indigenous Fashion Week Toronto and is working on two fashion-based projects: Giving Life and The Mint Sweater Project.



#### RICHARD ROSE - DIRECTOR

Richard Rose is the Artistic Director of Tarragon Theatre. Prior to joining the Tarragon in 2002, Richard was Founding Artistic Director at Necessary Angel (a position he held from 1978–2002), Associate Director for Canadian Stage Company, Director of the Stratford Festival Young Company and spent ten seasons directing at the Stratford Festival.

He has directed plays across Canada, the United States, and in London's West End in styles ranging from the environmental to the classical. Richard is well known for developing new work, including four plays that won the Governor General's Award and nine other nominated plays. He is a four-time Dora award winner for direction and production and has had numerous nominations.

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
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
